

## Story #116a Glen Carter

Private Stephan “Glen” Carter (1912-2009) was a Mazomanie World War II veteran and a charter member of the Mazomanie Greening – Buelow American Legion Post #437.

Glen enlisted in the Army on March 26, 1942, with SN 36220487 and mustered out on October 24, 1945, having served over three years. It is not known what unit he served with, nor what his military occupation was. His brother John also served in the war.

Glen was born in Mazomanie on December 8, 1912 to Mazomanie Township farmers Frieda Wendt and Clarence Wendt. He is found there with his family at the 1920 and 1930 US Census. He started working for the Milwaukee Road on the bridge pile driving crew in April 1936. The single 27 year old Glen Stephen is found living with his parents at the 1940 US Census of Mazomanie Village. His occupation is listed as a carpenter for the CMSTP&P RR. Glen married Marion L. Schlick (1910-2010) in Black Earth on November 23, 1940. She was the daughter of Otto and Annie Lockwood Schlick. Marion was a bookkeeper at a garage, bank and Patron’s Mercantile Coop. His October 16, 1940 Draft Card listed him as 5’-10”, 180 # with a ruddy completion, brown hair and hazel eyes. He was working for the railroad.

After the war, Glen continued to work as a bridge pile driver and carpenter for the Milwaukee Road for over forty years. The couple lived in Mazomanie and Black Earth until Glen passed away on June 9, 2000, living to be 95. Marion lived to be 100 years old. They are buried in the Mazomanie Cemetery.
